



Tea with Grandpa BY BARRY SALTZBERG

"Every day at half past three..." a little girl and her grandfather have tea. They spend time talking, telling stories, singing and even dancing. It's not until the end of the story that we find out that their daily tea time is made possible by modern technology. A touching story of family togetherness for a new generation.



Here I Am

Leaving his homeland for a strange new city a young boy feels, overwhelmed, sad and sometimes angry. The language is new, the culture is different, the food is strange, it's nothing like home. He discovers a seed stuck to his coat, a seed that traveled with him from his homeland, and is thrilled. But when he drops it out of a window and loses it he begins a journey of discovery. There are amazing things for him to explore around every corner and one very special discovery awaiting him at the journey's end.

Battling Boy BY PAUL POPE

A hero for a new generation. Earth is overrun by monsters and its hero is dead. But there is hope, albeit hope in a strange form. On the eve of his thirteenth birthday demigod Battling Boy is sent Rambling to prove his manhood. Sent to earth. Will he be its savior or will he fail and leave the earth to its dismal fate?



The Wonderful Wizard of Oz BY ERIC SHANOWER

A delightful adaptation of Frank L. Baum's books for a modern generation of readers. A bit repetitive in the text but that is easily overlooked when considering the young audience for whom the books are intended and the colorful animated illustrations that will delight even the grumpiest of the grumpies. To date there are 7 volumes written by Eric Shanower and illustrated by Skottie Young.

Doll Bones BY HOLLY BLACK

A delightfully creepy tale of an old bone china doll and the children who discover its haunting. More than that this is a tale of growing up and being pushed into giving up childhood things and not being ready to let go. Poppy says it best, "I hate that you're going to leave me behind. I hate that everyone calls it growing up, but it seems like dying. It feels like each of you is being possessed and I'm next."



In a Glass Grimmly BY ADAM GIDWITZ

As delightful as his first Grimm book, A Tale Dark & Grimm, In a Glass Grimmly is the tale of Jack and Jill and their search for the Seeing Glass. Their journey is chronicled in gruesome detail as they meet with giants, goblins and a giant salamander. There are guts, blood and vomit galore so be forewarned. There is plenty of humor as well and the children learn a valuable lesson about self-acceptance along the way.

The Fault in Our Stars By John Green

The relationship between Hazel and Augustus, two young people forced into adulthood before their time, is precious and poignant. The emotions they express are raw, real and easily recognizable by anyone who has cancer or has been close to someone with cancer. It's unapologetic in its honesty, difficult to read and impossible to put down. It is in the same vein as Jodi Piccoult's *My Sister's Keeper* and Nicholas Sparks' *A Walk to Remember.*



Hollow City BY RANSOME RIGGS

I loved *Miss Peregrine's Home for Peculiar Children*, Ransome Riggs first book, so was really looking forward to its sequel Hollow City and I wasn't disappointed. The book picks up exactly where Miss Peregrine's leaves off with the children fleeing their home and place of safety. The book centers on the children's quest to find help for their beloved caretaker Miss Peregrine who is stuck in bird form and can only be helped by another like her. There is no lack of drama, nail biting action, and plot twists as the children make their way to London. You won't be bored. I can't wait for the next!
