

Seymour Library Teen Area Expanded



Many changes have been made to the teen area recently. Since librarians love when young people choose to spend time in the library, the idea was to give teens more space to hang out, collaborate on projects, play, read, use iPads, or personal tablets or laptops.

The Young Adult books, which are popular with adults as



well, were moved outside of the Teen Scene. Now everyone has easy access to the latest trilogy or manga.

Inside the Teen room, space has been opened up for hanging out, playing Wii, PlayStation, or using the library iPads. Board games are also available.

A staff desk outside the Teen Scene door staffed either by Jill Willey,

Youth Services Assistant, or other staff members ensures that teens also have their research needs met.

Electronic game players and games are available for sign out at this desk as well.

The concept for the teen room came from the Maker Movement sweeping across the nation in libraries and schools. This movement encourages people to discover what they enjoy doing by experimentation. The library is providing more materials, programs, and opportunities for teens to make something, create something, learn something. Whether it is knitting, coding, building or animating the library is committed to bringing these experiences to the Jackson County community.



Library Celebrates 110 Years on January 5

Seymour library collection dates back to 1857, when a new library room was completed and was ready for reception of new books. Seymour's Carnegie library opened on January 5, 1905 with 2,066 books and 988 registered users.

Circulation for the year topped out at 17,031. Library books could also be borrowed from city and township schoolrooms and the hospital in Seymour.

In 2013, the library owned 109,380 items, including 9,967 video materials and 182 magazine and newspaper subscriptions. 19,644 registered borrowers at the Seymour, Crothersville, and Medora libraries and on the Discovery Bus borrowed 340,588 items throughout the year, including 1,185 music, audiobook, or ebook downloads.
