The Half Life of Molly Pierce by Katrina Leno

Great young adult read that will keep you turning the pages. When I began the book, I thought it was going to be a science fiction story because of how the first 3/4 of the book is written; however, it ends up going in a completely different, amazing direction. Leno's writing really connects you with the main character as you experience her trials and tribulations of being a teenager. Sometimes I had trouble understanding what was going on in Molly's head, but that's the beauty of the story: it's a mystery until everything is finally explained at the end. *The Half Life of Molly Pierce* also touches on teen issues such as suicide and peer pressure.

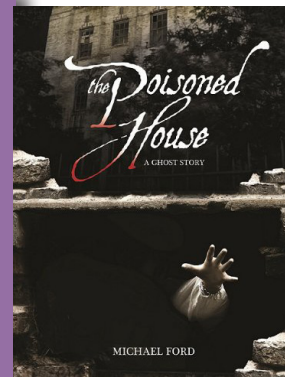

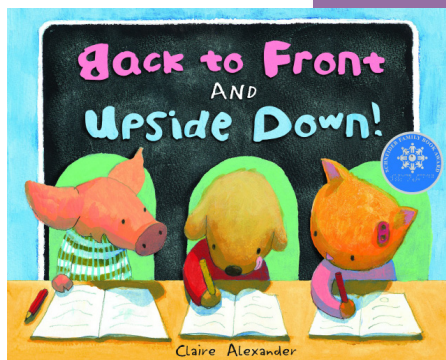


PICTURE BOOKS

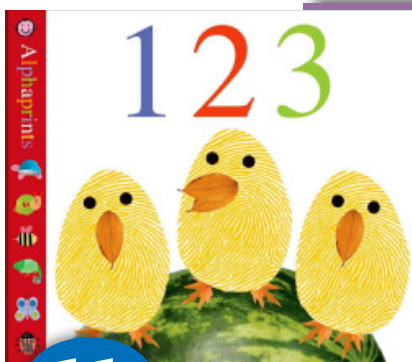

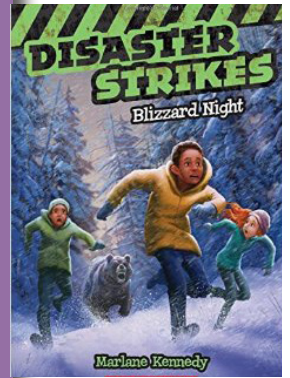

Disaster Strikes: Blizzard Night by Marlene Kennedy

Jayden is on a winter trip to the Michigan wilderness to enjoy some snowmobile riding with his foster family, the Walcotts. On their way there, a deer crosses the path of their moving vehicle and the van crashes! Mr. Walcott's leg is badly hurt, so Jayden and a couple of his foster siblings set out to get some help because the van is inoperable and all cell phones are of no use. Will the three of them be able to survive long enough to get help out in the cold winds and darkness? What will happen when their path crosses with a bear in the wilderness? Other titles in this series include *Earthquake Shock*, *Tornado Alley* and *Volcano Blast*.

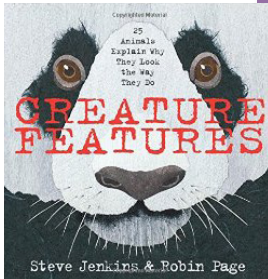

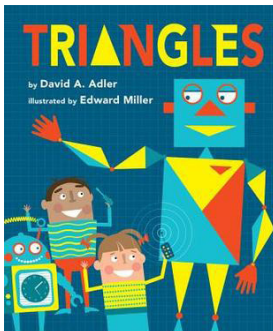


Triangles by David A. Adler
