

Have fun this summer reading for fun or to pursue some of your personal interests. Dig into reading at the library.

Two kids gave us their reasons for reading. Erin Otte, age 11, thinks the reason she likes to read is that "it gives you something to do and when you start to read a book you will just want to keep reading and reading. And when you are done you find out that it is a really good book."

Chanel Martinez, age 11, enjoys reading because, "You can learn almost anything by reading books. I like mysteries the best."

Several adult and teen book discussion groups are open for new members or people who just visit from time to time. We all have life experiences—and if I can associate with a character because I have had those same experiences, that really puts me in the story with that character. I have always enjoyed reading. It is a wonderful past time."






